The issue of what to do with found animals comes up regularly in neighborhood discussions.

Tips

- Post signs with big letters reading FOUND DOG/CAT/PUPPY/KITTEN. Post them at the corner of RR 12 and Skyline Drive. Photos, large phone numbers, and date found/lost are helpful.
- Post a notice to SRE Yahoo Groups mail list. If you are a subscriber, email skylineranch@yahoogroups.com. Otherwise, send email to info@skylineranch.org, and we will forward your announcement to the mail list. Mail list distribution is an immediate method of getting in touch with Skyline Ranch neighbors.
- Other places to post signs: grocery store, Ace Hardware, local banks, post office, and all along RR 12. Our drive-thru bank teller posted a sign for us, and the pet's owner saw it. Success!
- Call the local vets and post a flyer at their offices. They're very helpful and can scan an animal for microchip IDs too.
- Some of the shelters are no-kill facilities, but if they're full up, they won't accept new pets.
- If the pet you find has a collar, chances are someone is looking for it, so please keep reaching out in as many public ways as possible. Pets are family.
- Feral or found cats: Feral cats can be spayed/neutered for low cost by Emancipet, which regularly brings mobile services to the local area. Once the cats are "fixed" and can't reproduce, they can be released into the wild again.

Orphaned & Injured Wildlife

Skyline Ranch residents also regularly come across non-domesticated animals in the Hill Country. Many of us have had encounters with wild animals - deer, birds, rabbits, foxes, raccoons, skunks, etc. - which have appeared lost or in distress. Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD) maintains a web page re: dealing with orphaned and injured animals, as well as a listing of wildlife rehabilitators for Hays County.

Animal Referral Information

If you find a stray pet, you should consider avoiding to contact Hays County Animal Control. They will euthanize the pet within three (3) days if not claimed.
